

Homeless people in the United States.






There are


Most unoccupied homes are liveable. In fact many are simply held out of market to affect housing prices or provide a tax benefit.


Currently there is no place in the United States where a minimum wage worker can afford rent.





As a result, corporations have been making record profits and the gap between the working class and wealthy class has risen sharply.


