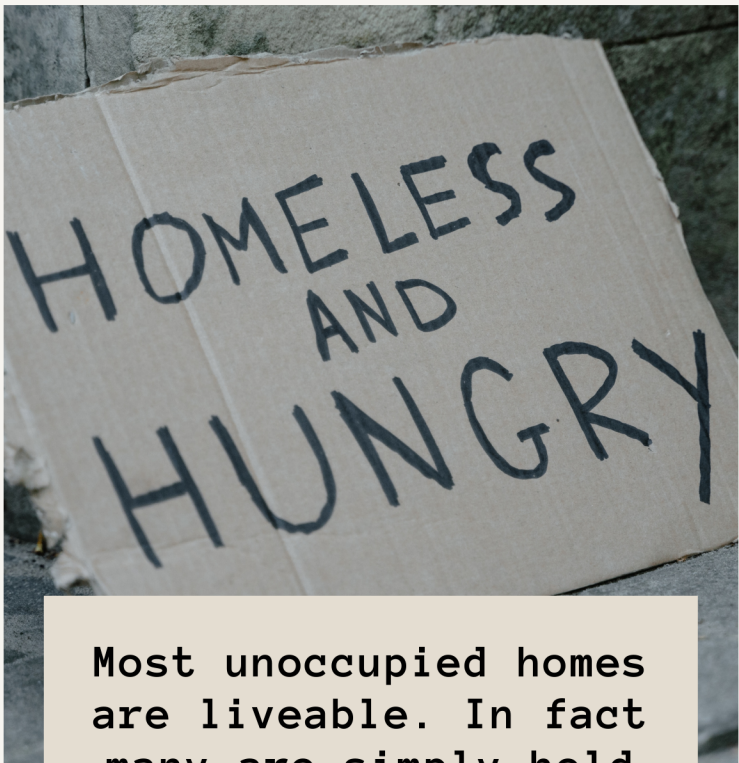

your neighborhoods .



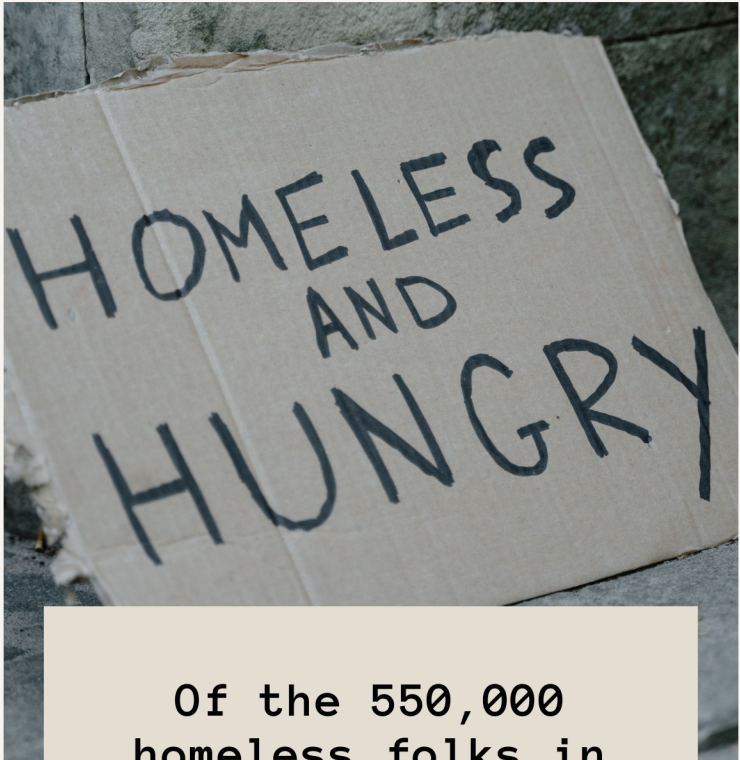
**Most unoccupied homes

Income and Expense Study



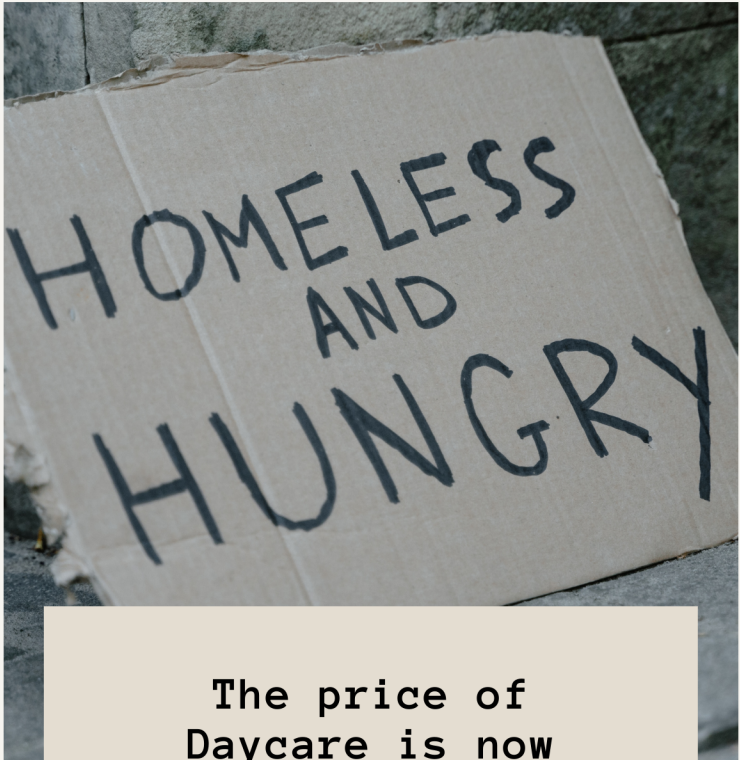
**Currently there is

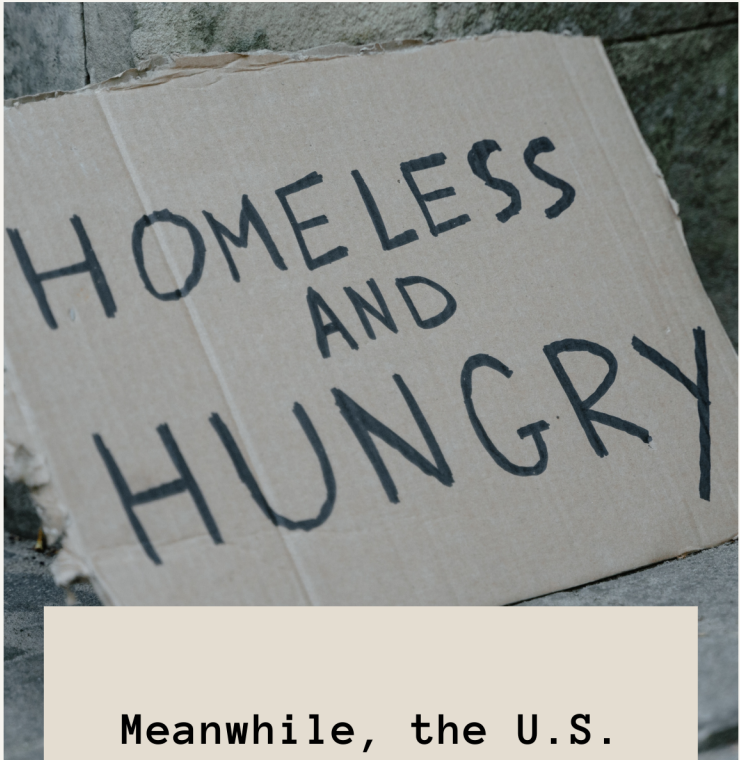

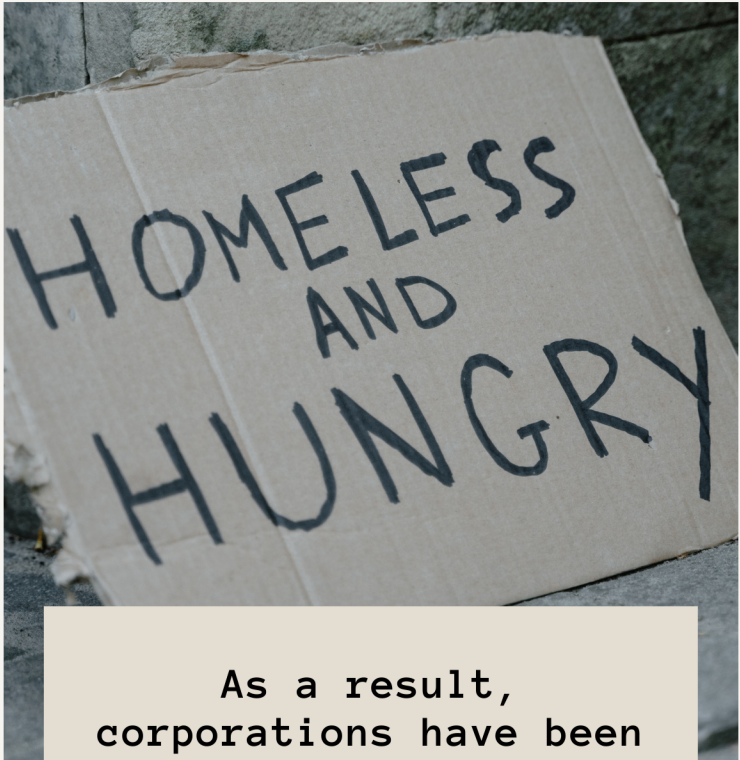
